Engagement Strategies for the Community Engagement Committee

Fostering Communication and Connection in Ignace, Ontario

Introduction

The success of any community initiative relies heavily on strong, consistent, and authentic engagement with residents. In Ignace, Ontario, the Community Engagement Committee (CEC) plays a vital role in serving as a bridge between the Township, NWMO and its citizens, especially on the development and placement of the Centre of Expertise and the Deep Geological Repository projects. An effective two-way communication strategy is essential—not only to provide quarterly updates to the community but also to ensure that the voices of residents are heard and valued. This discussion paper outlines innovative and practical concepts that the CEC can implement to enhance engagement and foster a more connected Ignace, as it directly applies to the projects stated above.

Key Engagement Concepts and Ideas

1. Quarterly Community Newsletter - Info Ignace

A quarterly newsletter is a tried-and-true method for keeping residents informed. The newsletter can be distributed both digitally and in print to ensure accessibility for all age groups. Content should include updates from the Community Engagement Committee meetings, upcoming events information such as the Nuclear Youth Symposium, progress on local projects, and highlights of NWMO achievements, licensing and regulatory updates and so on. A dedicated section for "Questions and Answers" or "Community Voices" can encourage residents to submit their queries or feedback for the next issue or directly to the CEC Committee members. Distributing newsletters at local hubs such as the Silver Tops, grocery store, library, and the community recreational centre ensures broad reach.

2. Community Engagement Committee Website

A regularly updated website acts as a central hub for all things Nuclear - Ignace. The site can host quarterly update reports, community calendars, COE and DGR project updates, and a "Have Your Say" portal for residents to offer feedback or ask questions. Incorporating a blog or news section allows for timely updates outside the quarterly cycle. Features such as photo galleries and video updates from committee members can personalize the experience and drive engagement, especially among younger demographics.

3. Local Surveys and Polls

The CEC Committee should examine the potential for an engagement survey on the NWMO projects. Surveys and polls are invaluable tools for gauging community sentiment. Quarterly online and paper-based surveys can seek input on topics such as municipal priorities related to the progress of the COE or DGR, satisfaction with information flow to residents, or ideas for new initiatives on how to engage on future project updates on nuclear. To maximize participation, incentives like draws for local gift cards or "Ignace swag" can be offered. Surveys should be brief, accessible, and available in multiple formats, including at local events and public spaces.

4. Town Hall Updates and Open Forums

Two town hall meetings should be planned and delivered in 2026. These will provide opportunities for direct dialogue between the CEC committee members and residents. These can be scheduled bi-annually and designed to be both informative and interactive. Virtual attendance options ensure that those unable to join in person can still participate. Each session should feature an update from the committee, a Q&A segment, and breakout discussions on topics of current interest around the development of the COE and DGR projects and include members of the NWMO. Summaries and recordings can be posted online and recapped in the newsletter for wider accessibility.

5. Attendance at Community Lunches and Events

Meeting residents where they are—at community lunches, fairs, or local gatherings—offers informal touchpoints for engagement. The CEC can set up an information booth or host a "Coffee with Members" table, providing updates and collecting feedback in a casual setting. This approach is particularly effective for reaching those who may not attend formal meetings or use digital platforms. Committee members' visible presence reinforces trust and approachability. The Silver Tops or Ignace Business Association would be two great venues to attend and provide residents with an opportunity to provide ideas and feedback to the Committee Co-Chairs of CEC.

The upcoming Nuclear Youth Symposium in Ignace is set to be a dynamic and informative event that will bring together young residents (high school students) interested in career development or nuclear science and local development. The symposium will feature interactive workshops, keynote speakers from the NWMO, Skills Ontario and other stakeholders and opportunities for youth to share their perspectives on nuclear projects and community engagement. Not only will participants gain valuable knowledge and skills, but they'll also have the chance to contribute their voices to ongoing conversations about Ignace's future, fostering the next generation of informed and engaged community members.

Best Practices for Effective Engagement

- Accessibility: Ensure all communications are available in multiple formats (print, digital, large print) and languages as needed.
- Consistency: Maintain a regular schedule for updates and events to build anticipation and routine.
- Transparency: Clearly communicate how resident feedback is used in decision-making.

- Inclusivity: Actively reach out to underrepresented groups, including youth, seniors, and Indigenous residents.
- Recognition: Publicly acknowledge and thank residents for their input and participation.

Conclusion

By leveraging a combination of traditional and modern communication methods—newsletters, a community website, local surveys, town halls, and informal gatherings—the Community Engagement Committee can foster a culture of open dialogue and mutual respect. These strategies will not only keep Ignace residents well informed on the upcoming NWMO projects but also empower them to shape the future of their township. The CEC's commitment to authentic, consistent engagement will help build a stronger, more connected Ignace for all.
