

Mix all the ingredients well. Place in sealers and store in a cold place. It will keep for weeks, if not eaten long before that!

French Fried Skunk

If you want to startle your dinner guests here is a way to do it. As the meat is darker than rabbit, you may want to pass it off as some similarly coloured wild game.

2 skunks, skinned and cleaned I tablespoon salt

Water to cover

2 cups vegetable oil for

2 egg yolks, beaten 3 cups milk or cream

1/2 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons baking powder

Clean and wash the skunks, cup skunk meat, cooked and ground making sure that the scent glands are removed. Cut up into small pieces. Place a soup kettle on the stove and add the meat. Cover with cold water and bring to a boil over high heat. Lower the heat and boil until meat is tender, about 35-40 minutes

Remove all the scum that rises to the surface. Make a batter by mixing together the egg yolks, milk, flour, salt and baking powder. Mix thoroughly until batter has the consistency of cake batter. Heat the vegetable oil in deep fryer at 360 degrees F. Dip the ces of skunk in the batter, then them in the dep fryer until den brown. Drain well & serve!

Now this is actually a tasty little recipe that is compliments of Cheryl Manchulenko. The story behind it is that her father-in-law, John Manchulenko loved this loaf and she always made it for him. When he would cut a piece for him and his wife, Mary; he got ¾ of the slice and she got ¼. I know from first- hand knowledge that this is one of the best blueberry loaves and it is the best when fresh berries are used.

Blueberry-Orange Loaf

½ cup orange juice

¼ cup boiling water

2 Tbsp margarine, melted

3 tsp grated orange peel

1 cup sugar

1 egg, slightly beaten

2 cups flour

1 tsp baking powder

½ tsp salt

¼ tsp baking soda

1 cup of blueberries

2 Tbsp orange juice

2 Tbsp honey

Blend together the first four ingredients; let cool. Beat sugar and egg, well. Blend flour, baking powder, salt, and baking soda, then add alternately with orange juice mixture to sugar-eff mixture, blinding thoroughly after each addition. Gently, fold in the blueberries and turn into a greased and waxed paper lined 9" loaf pan. Bake in a preheated over 350 degrees for 45 – 55 minutes, or until done. While still hot, mix the 2 tablespoons of orange juice and honey together and pour over the still hot loaf. Don't remove from the baking pan; let cool in it.



TIPS FOR RECYCLING

Water - Before you let your used water swirl down the drain, find ways to recycle it in and around your home. You can go as simple as pouring water from cooking pasta directly into a flower bed. Greywater is the water throughout your home that has been used for a single purpose such as bathing, cleaning dishes or washing clothing. This water can be recycled to support your lawn and garden keeping your landscape fresh and green in a less wasteful manner, not to mention saving on your monthly water bill.

Batteries – Battery Recycling Fact 1:

When improperly disposed of, batteries can leak heavy harmful metals, such as nickel, cadmium and lithium which contaminate our local soils, groundwater, and streams. If incinerated, batteries release toxic gases containing heavy metals into the atmosphere.

Fact 2: Harmful toxins can be ingested by wildlife, which may eventually make their way up the food chain and into the human body which can cause severe health problems. 80% of rechargeable batteries contain nickel cadmium, which is a carcinogen.

Fact 3: Technology has increased our reliance on batteries. Last year approximately 3 billion batteries were sold in North America. As our love of and reliance on tech grows, so will our battery usage.

Fact 4: Far too many batteries are trashed every year. Canadians throw away over 745 million batteries a year. Only 5 % of batteries in Ontario are properly recycled.

Fact 5: Batteries are nonbiodegradable, and toxic to our environment. However, all batteries are recyclable, and much of the material con be used to make new products.



Highlights of Township of Ignace Council Meeting (20 September, 2021)

Ignace Council Meeting - Called to Order at 6:00 pm

Dale Smyk presented a Fire Smart Plan – The purpose of the FireSmart plan is to provide a community with the steps to be taken to make it safer from the threat of a wildfire. These steps are a combination of operational and administrative initiatives to establish and maintain a FireSmart program. A number of field visits were made throughout the community during the spring and summer of 2019. The plan outlines several FireSmart goals for the community. FireSmart requires the buy in of community leadership and the residents to be successful. Just to give an example of an issue that could happen in Ignace; residents along West Beach Drive could be at risk, if a wildfire were to cut off their evacuation route to Highway 17. It is recommended that an evacuation plan be developed for these residents to outline other avenues for egress from the area, if road were not an option. The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (OMNRF) and Emergency Management Ontario may be able to provide assistance with this endeavor. A FireSmart committee should be developed at the outset, to provide direction and continuity for the program over time. The entire FireSmart Plan is outlined in the Council Package and can be found on the Township of Ignace website – www.ignace.ca.

Mayor's Report – The month of August was busy for Council, administration and public works with the numerous projects – paving streets, parking lots, grooming grounds throughout the community and demolition of abandoned trailers.

There were numerous on-line and in-person meetings with the NWMO. The willingness survey was launched and the Township of Ignace staff are reaching out in the community to ensure we include everyone's input.

September will see the Township getting ready for fall and winter – putting away summer equipment and getting equipment ready for the winter months.

Treasurer, Christy McIntomney's report – The finance team continues to bill monthly for utilities – a review is being conducted on all accounts to ensure every property with the services are being billed.

The final tax billing was mailed to customers in July, payments for the final tax bill are die September 30th and October 31, 2021.

The finance team is currently working on completing the 2019-year end. The Auditors from BDO are currently at the Township doing the final audit on the 2019-year end. BDO is hoping of complete the financial statements by the end of October 2021. The finance team is now working on the 2020-year end.

Jeff Lederer, Manager of Planning, Development, and Engagement Services Report – Property transactions continue to be busy – we have reviewed/prepared 12 property compliance certificates as well as review 26 zoning inquiries. There have been 14 building reviews/permits filed with the Township of Ignace.

Recreation will now be part of the Planning, Development, and engagement Services so we welcome Katelyn Hamre to our team. As part of the official plan, all properties, development, and activities along the Highway Corridor and commercial-related activities. We will be updating the site plan by-law for council review and approval. An updated site plan control by-law has been developed that is based on Provincial standards and expectations as it relates to present and future development of properties located along the highway corridor.

We will be developing a recreation master plan, exploring topic areas including, but not limited to: indoor/outdoor recreational facilities, community well-being programs/services, healthy living protocols, and parks and open spaces. Discussing and getting input for an arts and culture master plan.

We continue to work closely with KDSB, MCCHCH and the Silver Tops in developing a 20-unit facility. The asphalt paving and painting of lines have been completed. The front boulevards (between the Highway and parking lot) are planned to be regraded and cleaned using small gravel at the end of September/beginning of October.

Stage 1 of the Senior Walk/Urban Art Trail has been completed. There is some remediations work need to ensure that materials so not further erode into the creek bed. We will also be commissioning art pieces from local artists that captures and celebrates the community spirit and natural beauty that surrounds Ignace. Lily Pad Pond also requires some remediation work as per MNRF recommendations (guardrail) to deter ATVs from entering and exiting the area disturbing the natural habitat.

A Strategic Corporate and Communications Plan will be developed with grant money from the province. (cont'd Page 6)

Grant funding is being explored for the doggie park.

Grant funding is still being explored for the Ignace Silver Tops, Ignace Recreation Complex (mechanical and electrical, hall and kitchen upgrades), Township of Ignace bathrooms, Urban Art Trail and Landfill.

We anticipate a decision about the High-Speed Internet Grant in early fall.

The landfill site will be getting some upgrades. The province has awarded the Township of Ignace \$100,000 along with \$100,000 from a previous grant that will allow for new scales, security and a new building.

Clerk Lynda Colby's Report – Several by-laws have been updated and received confirmation approval from the Office of the Regional Senior Justice Ontario Court of Justice Northwest Regions. (Refer to council package for the full list). We will be looking at an asset management program for the Township.

The by-law enforcement officer will now take over the duties of animal control officer. The township thanks Pam Flory for her years of dedicated service as the Animal Control Officer for the Township of Ignace.

Ignace Cemetery Committee - Next meeting 13 October, 2021 at 9 am.

Ontario Police Service Association Board Committee (OPSAB) - Next meeting is in November 2021.

The Economic Development Advisory Committee (EDAC) – Next meeting is September 29, 2021 at 6:30 pm. Anyone with any questions with regards to the meeting can contact Leisel Edwards at the Township of Ignace office – 807-934-2202.

The Township of Ignace has advertised the position of Manager – Public Works Department.

Recreation programmer Katelyn Hamre's Report – September was quiet with no summer students and Katelyn took a break to get married. Congratulations Katelyn and Dave.

Kids Zone is starting back up on September 22nd,2021 and is in partnership with the Mary Berglund Community Health Centre.

The Recreation Committee meeting will take place September 22, 2021 at 7:00 pm. Topics will include Garden Gnomes, Fall/Winter Programming and the Outdoor Rink Project.

Dan Arbour's Report – Municipal Law Enforcement Officer/Property Standards Officer/Animal Control Officer – There was a total of 77 formal complaints/inquiries made by the residents of Ignace for August. This number does not include the number of anonymous complaints.

Council Adjourned to the Closed Session and upon exit, the following occurred:

Five municipal surplus properties were sold.

Under the Community Improvement Plan a grant was approved for the replacement of windows.

Council directs administration to commence the Request for Expression of Interest for an Integrity Commissioner/Closed Meeting Investigator for the Township of Ignace.

Juniper, Stranded and Alone

Juniper's world was turned upside-down when she was thrown from a single vehicle roll-over accident on the Trans Canada Highway, just west of Little Wabigoon River, between Ignace and Dryden, Ontario. Emergency medical workers cared for her owner (K.T.) and got her to Dryden Hospital. Police told K.T. that her seatbelt had saved her life. That was on the afternoon of August 7th, 2021.



Juniper watched from the tree line as Fire, Police and a tow truck operator cleared the accident scene of debris and the demolished van was towed away. Juniper appeared to be uninjured and one of the people on scene tried to coax her back and out of the woods, but emotionally, June was as traumatized as her owner. K.T. came away with only a few minor bumps and bruises and she returned to the safety of her Southern Ontario home within a few days. K.T. and her mother were heartbroken to leave Juniper behind, K.T.'s recovery had to come first.

When Ignace Pets Search and Rescue (IPSAR) volunteers heard of the accident and of the lost dog, they immediately contacted the owner and then, jumped into action. Teams of two travelled the round trip of just over 100 km twice daily from Ignace throughout the 3 weeks search. They set up food and water stations in the area and kept track of the hundreds of sightings called in during the search. They advertised Juniper's situation on Facebook, put up posters around town, handed out smaller versions to travellers going west from Ignace. Searchers also headed out from Dryden and called in tips to the Ignace team.

During the search, they communicated by Phone, Text and Messenger.

Eventually, IPSAR set two live-traps in likely locations approximately 7 km apart in the bush along the highway. June ate from our feed stations and continued to run dear paths and the bush, popping every so often to run the bush line and being spotted by travellers. Sadly, she often disappeared from view for days at a time and sightings started to come in from as far west as Turgeon Road, some 25 km away from the search area. Other people were leaving food out all along the highway and Juniper was increasing her distances daily. That had to stop!

All of those actions were triggers that caused June to run further away and further into the bush. Juniper was no longer the calm and confident dog that K.T. and Karen had loved and raised. She was in a dangerous environment, forced to return to her wild side to keep herself safe from predators. She was semi-feral and wanted nothing at all to do with people, friend or foe. The focus of the search team was always to keep the dog within the search area, by having her come to rely upon and trust the designated feed stations near the live-traps. While there, she learned


K.T. stayed home, struggling with concussion symptoms, but her mom, Karen drove back to Ignace to join in on the search a few days before June was trapped.

to appreciate and trust the scents of the searchers.

The day Juniper was trapped (September 5th) was the busiest and most exciting day of the search. The previous night, Juniper had been spotted near Turgeon Road, 25 km to the west! Not wanting to trap a wild animal by mistake, we disarmed the trap near Little Wabigoon River. Less than 12 hours later, she was back in that original search area. The live-trap was quickly rearmed and three of our vehicles started surveying the highway. Sure enough, she was east of the trap and running west in the bush. Karen walked the tree-line, calling her dog but while Juniper looked right at Karen, the wind was blowing in the wrong way and June ran the other way.

DOUBLE FATAL COLLISION CLOSES HIGHWAY 11-17 IN THUNDER BAY



On Saturday Sept 12, 2021 at 10:17 pm members of the Thunder Bay Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police received a report of a motor vehicle collision on Hwy 11-17 at the intersection of Hwy 102 also known as Sistonen's Corner. Investigation revealed that a westbound tractor trailer unit on Hwy 102 had struck a pick-up truck hauling a fifth wheel trailer travelling eastbound on Hwy 11-17. The passenger of the Tractor Trailer Unit, Ahmed OMER, 38 years old of Calgary, Alberta was pronounced deceased at the scene. The driver of the Tractor Trailer Unit, Parmohit CHAUDHARY, 38 years old from Acton, Ontario was transported to hospital with critical injuries where he was later pronounced deceased.



The four occupants of the pick-up truck were transported by multiple ambulances to hospital with serious but non-life-threatening injuries. A six-year-old child was flown to London for further evaluation. Hwy 11-17 remained closed until 2:40 pm on Sunday 12 Sept. 2021. Traffic was re-routed through Hwy 102.

This is the story of how I did that."



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





Indoor Visitors:

ALL Adults are to wear masks and children ages Grade One and above are required to wear a mask.

Children younger than Grade One are encouraged to wear a non-medical or cloth mask.

Children under 2 years of age are not recommended to wear a mask. Hand washing, social distancing and respiratory etiquette are among the most important protective strategies.

What Do You Need to Be Successful as A Fire Fighter?

- Food reference checks, a clean criminal record check and good life style choices will make you a good representative of your fire department.
 - A medical test will indicate that you have the physical fitness required to be a firefighter.
 - A clean drivers abstract will indicate to us that you have respect for public safety.

How Does It Work?

You will participate in training. Once you have successfully completed the Basic Fire Fighter training you will be issued a pager and be permitted to enter burning buildings. You will be expected to attend training events and meetings and respond to emergency calls. All of your uniforms, books and personal protective equipment will be supplied at no cost to you. We also provide an accident and sickness policy coverage.

You will learn about the seismic monitoring station that is collecting data about the tiny amount of seismic activity in the area.

You will learn about the meteorological station that is giving us information about the weather in the area – in detail never studied before.
