Fibre Internet Infrastructure is coming to IGNACE

The Northwestern Ontario Innovation Centre (NOIC) is proud to announce the approval of their applications for federal and provincial funding for the Ignace FTTH project (Fibre-To-The-Home).



The total project cost is \$1,804,040 with combined provincial and federal funding of \$1,318,561. Celerity Telecom as the selected vendor partner will contribute \$485,479. The Ignace FTTH project will make fibre internet infrastructure available to 691 households in Ignace, ON. As a result of this project, Celerity Telecom will invest up to an additional \$207,300 to connect households to the new infrastructure.

"This funding announcement is the culmination of many years of work. NOIC has issued Expressions of Interest and Requests for Proposal for the Ignace area for many years, trying to find a vendor partner. Unfortunately, the business case wasn't there, and no vendors expressed interest until we met with the Celerity Telecom team. Their experience with fibre deployment in rural Northwestern Ontario makes them the ideal vendor partner for this project. It's imperative that we find ways to get all our communities online with fast, reliable internet service and it is almost impossible without the generous funding programs provided by our federal and provincial governments. Our rural communities deserve the same access to internet services as their urban counterparts and this is a significant step in closing the digital divide. I couldn't be happier for the city of Ignace, their residents and businesses, and the region as a whole." – Jeff Coull, Northwestern Ontario Innovation Centre

Community Improvement Plan (Implemented in August 2018)

The Township of Ignace focused on strengthening its local economy through strategic approaches aimed at building the right capacity to accommodate the right type of investments as it positions itself for long term sustainable growth and development.

The Town has created a Community Improvement Plan (CIP) to allow for municipal incentives to stimulate private and public sector investment in our community.

The comprehensive set of incentive programs presented below has been developed to realize the goals of the CIP by encouraging private sector re-development and re-investment in Ignace. These programs have been developed based on discussions with community members, Township staff, Township Council, the Advisory Committee, as well as a review of municipal best practice. Applicants may use individual incentive programs, or combine multiple programs for a single site or development, unless otherwise specified. Incentive programs for eligible projects may also be combined with other federal and provincial funding programs. All programs are subject to funding allocated by Township Council on an annual basis.

Program Name	Overview
Municipal Land Disposition Program	Sale of municipally-owned surplus lands at up to 90% below market value where a proponent is prepared to apply for a building permit within two years of purchase.
Tax Increment Equivalent Grant	Grant representing 100% rebate of the municipal portion of a property tax increment resulting from redevelopment, building improvements and new development.
Signage Improvement Grant	Grant representing 50% of construction and design cost related to signage improvements up to a maximum of \$5000.
Façade Improvement Grant	Grant representing 50% of construction design and costs related to façade improvements up to a maximum of \$5000.
Planning and Building Permit Fee Grant	Grant representing up to 100% of the cost of Official Plan Amendment applications, Zoning By-Law amendment applications, Minor Variance applications, or demolition applications where new development is proposed.
Accessibility Grant	Grant representing 50% of the construction cosets related to accessibility improvements to a maximum of \$2500.

Those found in violation may be subjected to a \$250 FINE



Fact Sheet: Standards of Care for Dogs Kept Outdoors under the PAWS Act – Summary of Requirements (As of July 1, 2022)

Shade, Shelter and Protection from the Elements:



Sufficient protection from the elements to prevent heat or cold-related distress, and shade as required by the weather, including to protect from direct sunlight



A dog shelter, available at all times, that:

- Is waterproof and provides protection from the elements
- Is structurally sound and does not cause injury
- Has an insulated roof, a level, elevated and dry floor, and is ventilated
- Has a doorway free from obstructions
- Has bedding at least 3 inches thick, changed as needed to stay clean, dry, comfortable and unsoiled

Size of the shelter must allow all dogs using it to turn around, lie down with their legs extended and stand with their heads held at normal height



Livestock guardian dogs and dogs with access to a structurally sound building used to house livestock do not require a dog shelter

A dog "kept outdoors" is a dog that is outdoors for more than 60 minutes without its owner or custodian present

Food and Water:



Food that meets daily caloric requirements, is fit for consumption, not spoiled and does not contain dirt, feces, urine or toxic substances



Water at all times that is not frozen, does not contain dirt, feces, urine or toxic substances, and is replaced at least once every 24 hours

Food and water containers must be constructed to avoid injury and difficulty accessing food and water

Health and Grooming:



Daily health and welfare checks

Isolation from other healthy dogs if the dog is at high risk of or suffering from a contagious disease (with exceptions)

Dogs must not be kept outdoors if they have an injury or illness that affects their ability to regulate temperature or restricts mobility (with exceptions)



Grooming, as needed, of nails and to avoid matting of the dog's coat or accumulation of ice or mud on its coat or under its paws

The full text of the regulation is available at the Ontario e-Laws website. This document is intended to provide a summary only and is not legal advice. If there is any conflict between this document and the regulation, the regulation is the final authority. Produced April 2022.





Regulated waste can't simply be thrown into a garbage bin, poured down a drain, or taken to a landfill

Regulated Waste Disposal

- Waste industrial water (including wash water sludge)
- Empty containers (including empty metal drums and oil fluid containers)
- Remediation & demolition waste (tank bottoms, contaminated soil, mercury spill clean-up, asbestos disposal)
- Any regulated waste materials generated from an industrial process, or waste by-products slated for disposal including solids, semi-solids and sludge
- Waste paint and stains
- Spent lamps (mercury-bearing and non-mercury-bearing)
- Waste oil and lubricants (including hydraulic oil, lubricating grease, coolants and effluent solutions)
- Spent batteries (alkaline, nickel, UPS, lithium, car, cadmium, lead acid, laptop, mercury, rechargeable, silver oxide etc.)

Pâques et un atelier de bande dessinée chez Immaculée-Conception, c'est amusant!




Easter and cartoon workshop fun at Immaculée-Conception

The students also participated in a comic book workshop with a cartoonist via Zoom thanks to *Éduc-Action*. It's always a blast to learn while having fun!











IGNACE OPP INVESTIGATE COLLISION

Tell Me a Story

A few years ago, my friend and I decided to take a trip to Scotland. My father was born and raised there; my friend's family a couple of generations back had also come from Scotland. We went with a tour and saw beautiful castles and lovely cathedrals and chapels. The tour took us to the Orkney Islands.

One of the sights I will never forget is the Italian chapel built on one of the small islands. It was built by Italian prisoners from the hulls of the sunken German war ships (to this day you can see the wreckage of those subs in the channel).

Now you would think that was the highlight of the tour, but no, we hadn't seen the chapel yet. When you walk in your breath is taken by the beauty of it.

There are no pews as it is a small structure; there is an altar. It is the painting that keeps you in awe of the talent that these men shared with their guards.

You see, one of the men was a very talented painter and painted biblical scenes on every space of the ceiling and walls, in beautiful colours that the guards would bring him to continue his work, and keep it fresh for the years they stayed there.

The prisoners and guards became friends, and after they were released at the end of the war, the painter came back to refresh the paintings. When he grew older, he brought his son every two years till his death to repair and refresh his artwork.

It now has been taken over by the Scottish Trust and kept the same. The guards would bring a priest or chaplain on Sundays so the prisoners could have Sunday service and they would join them. I think we all walked away from there more than a little in awe of what could happen in a small place, where they were just people being people, and enjoying each other amid the tragedy happening so close. It is a place everyone should have a chance to see and feel the peace and stillness.

The NWMO's 2021 annual report celebrates a year of progress



The Nuclear Waste Management Organization (NWMO) has now published our 2021 annual report, <u>Guided by science</u>. Grounded in knowledge. Committed to partnership. The report highlights the NWMO's activities throughout the year as we implement Canada's plan for the safe, long-term management of used nuclear fuel. The report also provides an audited update on the organization's finances. In accordance with the Nuclear Fuel Waste Act, the report was submitted to Canada's Natural Resources Minister Jonathan Wilkinson on March 28, 2022.

"In 2021, the NWMO continued to adapt to the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic and ultimately celebrated a year marked by progress and success," said NWMO President and CEO Laurie Swami. "Our progress to date will serve as a foundation. Great teamwork and a collaborative spirit will be the key to future success."

Key highlights from the annual report include how the organization has continued to travel a path together with Indigenous peoples on the journey towards Reconciliation, including rolling out additional staff training and educational opportunities, as well as interweaving insights from Indigenous Knowledge throughout the NWMO's work.

In 2021, vaccinations and reopening of communities allowed us to meet face-to-face again – critically important to our engagement process, where safe, in-person meetings help us build a better understanding of each other. Reestablishing these connections was crucial to keeping us on the path to partnership.

The NWMO also deepened our knowledge of the environment in the siting areas through borehole drilling work. Testing and analysis of core samples from deep underground is now well underway, a significant step that will enhance our understanding of whether the geology at the potential project sites can meet robust regulatory requirements.

The report also shows how the NWMO's Engineering team took big strides forward, with significant work done to prepare the organization for full-scale emplacement trials in 2022 that will simulate conditions in the deep geological repository, including prototyping and testing of our innovative engineered-barrier system.

In addition to the annual report, the NWMO has also released our five-year implementation plan – *Implementing Adaptive Phased Management 2022 to 2026* – a living document that outlines our activities for the next five years.
