Is Ignace a Willing Community?

Talking and learning are really good things. Everyone has an opinion, and everyone needs to have their say. Plenty has been said on social media about the proposed deep geological repository (DGR) and whether Ignace should host this project and how willingness will be determined.

We have been learning about this project for over a decade. A decision by the Nuclear Waste Management Organization (NWMO) will be made at the end of 2023. Even if Ignace is willing to host the project, it does not necessarily mean that the project will come here. NWMO must also weigh other protocols relating to safety and transportation.

Moving forward, our willingness journey will help us decide and let NWMO know if Ignace wants to be a host community. The residents of Ignace can only make a decision for Ignace.

Willingness in the form of a referendum will not take place because that is not what the people of Ignace indicated during our initial willingness plan. Over a six-month period, last year (May to November 2021), Ignace residents were asked to provide input through many public engagement venues (i.e., events, community "pop-ups", interviews, and surveys) about how they would like to see willingness proceed. Based on this public input, many community residents felt that not only further learning is needed to make an informed decision about the proposed DGR, but it should also include several public engagement activities to allow residents in having their say.

In December 2021, Council approved the next stage of our willingness journey which will involve a series of public engagement activities that will be proposed and undertaken by a third-party consultant – not by NWMO nor the Township of Ignace. In addition, the process undertaken for willingness over the next year will also be evaluated through a peer review committee with members who will be objective (having no ties to this project or community) and have expertise in environmental stewardship, community development, economics, safety, and public engagement/willingness. The Township, through a Working Committee, is presently looking for a consultant and peer review members and hope to have this in place by the end of June 2022.

Starting this summer, we anticipate a series of engagement activities (e.g., door to door & community surveys, debates, public forums,) to be undertaken. The community studies that look at the economic, social, and environmental considerations of the DGR for Ignace and surrounding areas will be finished and

The CNSC recognizes and understands the importance of engagement and building relationships with members of the public and Indigenous Nations and communities, and is taking concrete stops towards working together to ensure the safe and effective regulation.

Experts from the CNSC will be available to answer questions about the CNSC's licencing process and environmental assessments.

presented to the community over the summer and early fall - These studies will help each of us learn about potential community changes, transportation, and safety considerations from the proposed DGR – learning and understanding will help us better in making an informed decision.

Over the next year, the Township of Ignace will advertise the engagement activities both through social media, websites, community bulletins, and posters. Your involvement is important because it is how your say will be recorded (whether you are willing to support the DGR project or not). This is how we come to a collective decision.

It is important that we hear from every resident of Ignace. Whether Ignace Council members are in favour or not in favour of the project, they are required to listen and support OUR collective voice and decision of Ignace residents. Their resolution is based on the residents' voices not their personal views. We look forward in hearing from residents over the next year about this very important decision for our community.



Sun Safety - Did you know? In extreme heat, some medications may increase your health risk and/or make your skin more sensitive to UV rays. Talk Your Centre for Health and Wellbeing to your health care provider if you have any questions about your medication.

First aid advice for sunburn and heat illness

Sunburn (also called erythema) is caused by overexposure to <u>ultraviolet radiation</u> (UV rays). While the erythema symptoms are usually temporary (like red skin that is painful to the touch), skin damage is cumulative throughout a person's life and can develop into serious long-term health effects, including skin cancer.

Mild sunburn results in skin irritation and redness and can be safely treated at home. Severe sunburn requires medical attention. The first signs of a sunburn may not appear for a few hours. The full effect to your skin may not appear for 24 hours or longer.

Possible symptoms of sunburn include:

- Red, tender skin that is warm or sensitive to the touch
- Blisters that develop hours or days later
- Severe reactions (also called "sun poisoning"), including fever, chills, nausea, or rash
- Peeling skin on sunburned areas several days after the sunburn

Possible symptoms of heat illness include:

- Dizziness or fainting
- Nausea or vomiting
- Headache
- Rapid breathing and heartbeat
- Extreme thirst (dry mouth or sticky saliva)
- Decreased urination with unusually dark yellow urine
- Changes in behaviour in children (like sleepiness or temper tantrums)

What to do if someone gets a sunburn

- Immediately remove the person from the sun
- Place the person in a cool (not cold) shower or bath, or apply cool compresses several times a day. Do not wash burned skin with harsh soap
- Avoid creams or lotions that may hold heat inside the skin. Aloe can be used
- Offer the person extra fluids for the next two to three days
- If needed to relieve pain, give the person ibuprofen or acetaminophen, as directed. Do not give aspirin to
- Make certain all sunburned areas are fully covered to protect the person from further sun exposure


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



 Sunburn that forms blisters or is extremely painful

Facial swelling

Nausea, fever or seve

Pale, clammy or cool s.....

Tale, claiming of cool skill

- Rapid pulse or rapid breathing
- Eyes that hurt and are sensitive to light
- Headache, confusion or a feeling or faintness or dizziness
- Signs of dehydration (increased thirst, dry eyes and mouth, no urine output)
- Signs of skin infection (increasing redness warmth, pain, swelling, or pus)

Tell Me a Story

This is just a little late for the sugar season, but you can store it up in your memory in order to get things together in time for next spring.

Inspired by an article in Ignace Driftwood, April 13, 1983.

"For a number of years, every spring meant maple sugar time for me. Believe it or not, even in this part of the country, you can find enough maple trees to tap and make sure, if you are prepared to work for it!

I had to get permits from the MNR and permission from the Township for exclusive use of the area containing the maple trees, 26 acres altogether. The whole process started with choosing the best trees. Tramping through the snow and bush, I would locate trees that were big enough. Then I had to tap them, but drilling a hole in the tree with a brace and bit and then inserting a spile into the hole. If the sap was running well, it would immediately start to leak out the hole. The next step was to hook a pail under the spile for the sap to drip into. Then, just wait for the tree to do its thing. The trees had to be checked at least once every day and the sap collected and boiled down. If left, it would turn sour, and be no good for making syrup. Some sugar lots have a boiling shack right out in the bush, but I took mine home to boil it and deduce it to syrup. When it gets think you have to watch it carefully so you don't let it burn the sap usually runs for 2-3 weeks. Depending on the trees and the season, it takes about 40 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup. If you want sugar, you have to boil it even further, very carefully, because not one likes burnt sugar!

It's a lot of work, but anyone who has ever done it, and had homemade maple syrup to put on their pancakes, would say it's worth it."

OPP REPORT INCREASE IN CRYBERCRIME & CRYPTOCURRENCY SCAMS

Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) warn community members to beware of cryptocurrency scams, as all types of cybercrime/cyber enabled crimes are on the rise across North West Region. There was a 36 per cent increase of cybercrimes between the year 2020 and 2021 year-over-date.

Cybercrimes/cyber enabled crimes are defined as all online frauds and crimes against persons/businesses, cyberbullying/harassment, identity theft and data breaches. The number of incidents for the past two years were:

- 2020 95 occurrences
- 2021 129 occurrences

This year, there have already been 55 occurrences reported to police. In terms of cybercrime, there are many ongoing investigations in which individuals have reportedly lost over \$50,000. When it comes to all type of fraud, it is important to remember that actual figures of total occurrences or amounts lost are likely much higher, as only 5% of frauds are ever reported.

Cryptocurrency scams typically begin with the promise of high rates of return. Members of the public are reminded that there is an inherent risk in any investment. This is especially true for cryptocurrencies, which are not monitored and protected in the way that some other investments from major banks and reputable financial institutions may be. This offers no protection for individuals who invest their money in cryptocurrencies.


"The phrase, 'If it sounds too good to be true, then it probably is,' is particularly true when it comes to cryptocurrency." says Detective Staff Sergeant Ryan Gordon. "It is important to share information with your family and friends and to contact OPP if you have been the victim of any type of crime."




